BEST KEPT VILLAGE Message from Adam Killeya -Parish Clerk

The presentation of the Pushman Cup, as a result of our success in the Bucks Best Kept Village Competition, takes place at the Burnham Park Hall on the morning of Saturday 21st September. We are inviting the public to join us, along with councillors and staff, and if anyone in the church would like to attend they'd be very welcome, especially given your role in keeping the church areas looking so good.

The Hall will be open just before 10am, from about 1015 we will gather at the presentation spot: at the North East Corner of the land in front of Burnham Park Hall. The presentation party - the competition Chairman and Vice-Chairman, a Deputy Lieutenant (to be confirmed), the Judges, and the competition administrator - are touring all the winning villages in one day by Council Bus. Given our location they are going to come to us first, leaving





Aylesbury at 0930, arriving with us around 1015-1020. They won't be able to stay long, as they need to leave for Marlow by about 1045. The Chair of the Best Kept Village Competition, Cllr Bill Chappell, will do a brief speech, and present the trophy to our Chair Marie and one of our groundsman, Barry. Marie will then give a reply on behalf of the council. There will then be photos. Tea, coffee and biscuits will be available for everyone attending from our end in the Huntercombe Room from 1045-1130. It isn't essential to RSVP; just turn up if you are available.

For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and Then he returned from the region of say, 'Have a seat here, please', while to the one who is poor you say, 'Stand there', or, 'Sit at my feet', have you not region of the Decapolis. But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it.

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save vou? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill', and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Mark 7: 24-end

From there he set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her. 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go-the demon has left your daughter.' So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.
